

KNOW YOUR EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS

COVID-19 Updates

As of April 7, 2020

Are you a student? You have rights!

You should be able to continue classes through distance or online learning.

- Your school should give you online access to classes or provide work packets or other alternatives to classroom-based learning.
- You will not have to make up school days missed due to COVID-19 closures.
- You will not have any statewide testing for this school year (2019-20).
 - Graduating seniors eligible for the A+ Scholarship should go to https://dhewd.mo.gov/covid-19.php for updates on your eligibility requirements.
- You may be able to get free meals from your school district during COVID-19 closures. See https://sites.google.com/rsdmo.org/allourkids/regional-food-sites.

Are you a student with a disability? You have rights!

- Schools must give you <u>equal access</u> to any instruction it gives to other students during COVID-19 closures, including the provision of special education and related services in your IEP or 504 plan to the extent possible.
- Your IEP team is allowed to meet virtually with parental consent to confer about what individualized supports you may need while at home.
- If you have an IEP and are not receiving any services while school is closed, you might be able to get substitute services, including extra time with a special education teacher or therapist later in the year to make up for services you are not receiving now. Are you a student experiencing homelessness? You have rights!

- Your school must still enroll you immediately when you are homeless ask for the Homeless Liaison when enrolling.
- If you move to a new temporary place, and the new place you are staying is in a different school district then your other school, you still have the right stay enrolled in the current school of origin or you can enroll in the new school district.
- Your school must give you access to the same services that all other students have.
